We are proud to present the 2019 Annual Report of The DEED Foundation. This report highlights our accomplishments and financial status for fiscal year 2018 – 2019, as we celebrate the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our founding as a Missouri non-profit corporation.

Our mission is to improve the lives of youth, women, and families in the greater Kansas City area by sharing educational resources, advancing economic development, and promoting leadership opportunities through strategic partnerships, programs, and community initiatives. ## **EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

DEED provides mentoring, leadership development, and academic enrichment for urban youth by co-sponsoring three educational programs with the Kansas City MO Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.: Cotillion, Delta Academy, and Delta Gems. These programs are hosted at the Delta Athenaeum with the active participation of more than 100 students in a variety of age groups.



## Cotillion


Cotillion is a youth development and scholarship program for college-bound high school seniors. The co-educational program features a 3-day college tour, community service opportunities, workshops for college readiness, an essay competition, talent show, and formal scholarship presentation with a waltz performance. During the past three years, Cotillion

awarded \$163,000 in scholarships to 81 selected scholars based on their academic and extra-curricular achievements. This continues a 35-year tradition with more than \$1.1 million in college scholarships awarded to 973 male and female Cotillion participants since 1986.

## **Delta Academy**

The Dr. Betty Shabazz Delta Academy offers mentoring, educational activities, and service learning experiences for girls in the 6<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grades. With a major focus on math, science, and technology, the Academy provides early exposure to college and career options in non-traditional fields. Recently, the class of 25 scholars conducted electrostatic experiments with engineers at the Honeywell Plant, and they learned about personal health and hygiene from a nurse at

Children's Mercy Hospital. Service projects include volunteering at Harvesters Food Pantry to sort fruit and vegetables for healthy meals. The Academy year concluded with a Graduation Ceremony showcasing the unique talents of the class in performances of music, dance, and poetry.

## **Delta Gems**

Growing and Empowering Myself Successfully is the motto and impetus of the Dr. Jeanne N. Noble Delta GEMS program. Each month, the program engages 25-30 high school girls in two-hour modules focused on empowerment, personal growth, fiscal responsibility, and leadership. Through experiential learning and dialogues with career professionals, the teens build self-esteem and confidence with a mindset for success. They create vision boards, family



budgets, and entrepreneurial business plans as a roadmap for the future. Last Christmas, the girls volunteered for community service at Santa's North Pole Unwrapped by assisting young children with arts & crafts, face painting, and letters to Santa. The GEMS closed out the year fashionably adorned in hats, gloves, and fans at the Ethnic High Tea. This cultural celebration featured messages and gifts of self-affirmation, as well as powerful artistic performances by the talented teens.


## The Delta Athenaeum: Preserving and Making History

Since 1913, the Athenaeum has been owned and operated by women as a gathering place for philanthropy and civic activism in Kansas City's Hyde Park neighborhood. The Greek-revival style building was originally commissioned as the "Clubhouse" for the Athenaeum Club, whose members raised more than \$33,000 after their downtown meeting location was destroyed by fire in 1907. With more than a century of service, the Athenaeum Clubhouse became a landmark venue for women's advocacy, charitable causes, and social change.

DEED purchased the historic property in 2015, investing more the \$500,000 to renovate and restore its elegance and purpose. The building was renamed **THE DELTA ATHENAEUM** and now serves as the home of the Kansas City MO Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc., as well as an event space and commercial catering kitchen. For the first time in more than 100 years, the Athenaeum is now equipped with accessibility for the disabled, a parking lot, and a catering prep area for the ballroom level.

## The Delta District: A Commitment to Urban Investment

DEED has purchased several properties located adjacent to the Delta Athenaeum, with the goal of developing a diverse residential community of affordable, market-rate, and special needs housing. The planning process for 50 - 90 apartment units is underway through engagement with neighbors, social services agencies, and housing developers. The revitalization of vacant lots and distressed homes will enhance the streetscape of Linwood Boulevard and complement the vibrant retail development in the Troost corridor. Improved parking, lighting, and security are key features of the new **DELTA DISTRICT** that will encourage residents and guests to enjoy the neighborhood amenities.







## **Financial Highlights**

 At fiscal year-end, assets under management totaled more than \$50 thousand dollars. These funds are invested in equities, bonds, and cash under the prudent stewardship of our professional advisors and our Finance Committee.



Working in conjunction with our

advisors, the Finance Committee reviews our portfolio performance regularly with the objective of providing a steady stream of spending in support of the Foundation's mission, preserving the real purchasing power of the assets in perpetuity and maintain or growing the portfolio assets after adjusting for spending, fees, and inflation.

 Our targeted payout for Scholarships and Grants under Program Support is approximately 5% of our average assets. Scholarship assistance under our educational programs vary due to participants and fundraising.

## **BURN THE MORTGAGE**

### Capital Campaign 2015-2020

In December 2015, DEED began a five-year capital campaign to **BURN THE MORTGAGE** for the Delta Athenaeum and establish a property maintenance fund. The goal of the campaign is to raise at least \$311,000 by December 2020. During the past four years, donors have pledged nearly \$200,000 to the campaign and proceeds of \$153,000 have been collected. 

As a result of the strategic process, DEED has formalized its Mission and Vision Statements.

**Mission:** To improve the lives of youth, women, and families in the Greater Kansas City area by sharing educational resources, advancing economic development, and promoting leadership opportunities through strategic partnerships, programs, and community initiatives.
